REGULATIONS FOR UNDER GRADUATE DEGREE COURSES

IN HUMANITIES, SCIENCES, COMMERCE AND MANAGEMENT STUDIES CBCS PATTERN

With effect from 2020-2021

Definitions:

Programme : "Programme" means a course of study leading to the award of a degree

in a discipline.

Course: "Course" refers to a paper / practical / subject offered under the

degree programme.

Each Course is to be designed variously under lectures / tutorials / laboratory or field work / seminar / practical training / Assignments / Term paper or Report writing etc., to meet effective teaching and

learning needs.

Part I: Part I comprises of only 1 category namely Tamil / Other languages.

Tamil/Other languages

"Tamil/other languages" offered under Part I of the programme.

Part II: Part II comprises of 2 categories namely Communicative English and English.

Communicative English

"As per the direction of the Government of Tamilnadu the communicative English offered under part II in $\mathbf{1}^{st}$ and $\mathbf{2}^{nd}$ semester"

English

"English" language offered under Part II of the programme in 3rd and 4th Semester.

Part III: Part III comprises of 4 categories namely, Core Courses, Allied Courses, Elective Courses and Professional English course.

i) : Core Courses

"The Core Courses" related to the programme concerned including practicals offered under Part III of the programme".

ii) : Allied Courses

"Allied courses" offered under part-III of the programme, which is in nature but related to the programme concerned".

iii): Elective Courses

"Elective courses" related to the core courses of the programme concerned, offered under Part III of the programme".

iv) : Professional English Courses

"As per the direction of Government of Tamilnadu Professional English courses", offered under Part III of the programme".

(v) Individual / Group Project

"The Individual / Group Project" related to the core courses of the programme concerned, offered under Part III of the programme".

Part IV: Part IV comprises of 3 categories namely, (i) Tamil / Advanced Tamil /Non-Major Electives, (ii) Skill Based Courses and (iii) Foundation Courses.

(i)(a): **Tamil**

"Those who have not studied Tamil upto X std / XII std and taken a non-Tamil language under Part-I shall take Tamil comprising of two courses with 2 credits each (2x2=4 credits). The course content of which shall be equivalent to that prescribed for the 6th standard by the Board of Secondary Education and they shall be offered in the **third and fourth semesters**".

(OR)

(i)(b): Advanced Tamil

"Those who have studied Tamil upto XII std and taken a non-Tamil language under Part-I shall take Advanced Tamil comprising of two courses with 2 credits each (2x2=4 credits) in the third and fourth semesters".

(OR)

(i)(c) Non-Major Electives

"Others who do not come under a / b can choose the offered non-major electives comprising of two courses with 2 credits each (2x2=4 credits) in the **third and fourth semesters**"

(ii): Skill based Courses

"The courses offered as skill based courses under Part IV of the programme is aimed at imparting Advanced Skill". This comprises of four courses with 2 credits each (4x2=8 credits) from 3^{rd} to 6^{th} semesters"

(iii): Foundation Course

There are 3 Foundation Courses offered.

- (a) Environmental Studies offered in 1st Semester, under Part IV of the programme.
- (b) Value Education offered in 2nd Semester under Part IV of the programme.
- (c) Soft Skill offered in 2nd Semester under Part IV of the programme

Part V: Part V comprises of only 1 category namely Extension Activity.

Extension Activities

"All those activities under NSS/NCC/Sports/YRC programme and other co and extra- curricular activities offered under part V of the programme are part of the Extension Activities.

Each semester has 90 working days consisting of 5 teaching hours per working day. Thus, each semester has 450 teaching hours and the whole programme has 2700 teaching hours.

3. Course of Study

The course of study for the UG degree courses of all branches shall consist of the following:

PART-I: Tamil or any one of the following modern/classical languages i.e. Telugu, Kannada, Malayalam, Hindi, Sanskrit, French, German, Arabic & Urdu.

The subject shall be offered during the **first four semesters** with one examination at the end of each semester (4 courses : 4x4=16 credits). For para-professional branches (B.Com., B.B.A., etc.,) it shall be offered in the **first two semesters** with one examination at the end of each semester (2 courses : 2x4=8 credits).

PART-II: Communicative English and English Language

The Communicative English subject shall be offered each in I and II Semester with one examination at the end of each semester (2 courses: 2x4= 8 credits) and English Language subject shall be offered each in III and IV **semester** with one examination at the end of each semester (2 courses: 2x4= 8 credits). For para-professional programmes, (B.Com., B.B.A., etc.,) there shall be only communicative English two papers for the **first two semesters** with one examination at the end of each semester (2 courses: 2x4=8 credits).

PART-III

(i) Core subject

Core papers including practicals wherever applicable are offered as prescribed in the scheme of examination, by the Boards of studies of different subjects. There shall be 14 / 15 /16 Core papers including practicals, Professional English and Project with 65 credits for all UG Courses, except for para-professional courses like B.Com or B.B.A., However for B.Com or B.B.A., courses, there shall be 19 Core papers with 81 credits.

Theory Examinations shall be conducted in the core subjects at the end of every semester. However, there shall be practical examinations in the core subjects at the end of even semesters in general, with exceptions in a few courses as prescribed by the Boards of studies, concerned.

(ii) Allied Subjects

Allied papers including practicals wherever applicable are offered as prescribed in the scheme of Examination by the Boards of Studies of different subjects. There shall be 4 papers, **one each** in I, II, III and IV semester, for all UG Courses except for Science courses with practicals. However for all UG Science Courses, there shall be 6 papers including 2 practicals or 5 papers including 1 practical or 4 papers without practicals.

For all UG courses with / without practicals, for Odd semesters (1^{st} & 3^{rd}) there shall be 2 theory papers for a total of (2x3) = 6 credits only.

For all UG courses without practicals, for Even semesters $(2^{nd} \& 4^{th})$ there shall be 2 theory papers for a total of (2x5) = 10 credits only.

For UG Science courses with 2 Allied practicals, for Even semesters (2^{nd} & 4^{th}) there shall be 4 papers including 2 practicals, for a total of [(2x3=6) +(2x2=4) = (6+4)]=10 credits only. For all the 4 semesters, the total number of credits for Allied courses shall be 16 only.

(iii) Electives Courses

Three elective courses with (3x3=) 9 credits are to be offered one in the V Semester and two in the VI Semester. Elective subjects are to the selected from the list of electives prescribed by the Board of Studies concerned. Colleges can choose any one of the papers, as elective for a particular semester whether 5th semester or 6th semester. Elective paper for a particular semester once chosen by a particular college, should not be changed without getting prior permission and approval of the University.

(iv) **Professional English Courses**

Two Professional English Courses with (3x2=) 6 credits are to be offered each in I and II Semester for which examination shall be conducted at the end of the respective semesters.

(v) Individual / Group Project

There will be an Individual / Group project work is compulsory at the end of VI Semester as prescribed by the respective boards of studies. (Group will not be exceeding five students).

PART-IV:

- (i) Basic Tamil / Advanced Tamil (OR) Non-major elective
- (a) Those who have not studied Tamil upto XII std and taken a non-Tamil language under Part-I shall take Tamil comprising of two courses with 2 credits each (2x2=4 credits). The course content of which shall be equivalent to that prescribed for the 6th standard by the Board of Secondary Education and they shall be offered in the **third and fourth semesters**.

(OR)

(b) Those who have studied Tamil upto XII std and taken a non-Tamil language under Part-I shall take Advanced Tamil comprising of two courses with 2 credits each (2x2=4 credits) in the **third and fourth semesters**.

(OR)

(c) Others who do not come under the above a/b categories can choose the offered non-major electives comprising of two courses with (2x2=) 4 credits, in the third and fourth semesters.

(ii) Skill Based Subjects:

All the UG programmes shall offer four courses of **skill based subjects one each** in III, IV, V & VI semester with 2 credits each (4x2=8 credits) for which examination shall be conducted at the end of the respective semesters.

(iii) Foundation Courses:

There are 3 Foundation Courses offered.

- a) Environmental Studies offered in 1st Semester, under Part IV of the programme.
- b) Value Education offered in 2nd Semester under Part IV of the programme.
- c) Soft Skill offered in 2nd Semester under Part IV of the programme

HUMAN RIGHTS

COMPULSORY PAPER

(For all PG Degree Courses)

(with effect from 2020-2021)

Course Objectives

- 1. Human Rights are the rights of all Human Beings. They have universal application. Awareness about Human Rights and concern for its protection has become an important issue after the second world war and paved way for world Nations to come together for acceptance of Universal Declaration of Human Rights.
- 2. The role of UN in protecting and promoting awareness of Human Rights is highly significant. The binding nature of the International Conventions and Covenants are still a dilemma. The persuasive force in case of violation of human rights by International community is an area of concern. In the absence of National legislations enforcement of these rights remain as one farce.
- 3. To trace the development of regional instruments drafted aiming at protection of Human Rights and its enforceability.
- 4.The Indian perspective of protection of Human Rights vide its Legislations, the Constitution of India more read by its language, the Fundamental rights, Duties and Directive Principles of the State Policy has been elicited. The response shown by Indian judiciary and the expression of judicial activism is highlighted. The development of Human Rights jurisprudence in India is traced.
- 5. The Special legislations and the enforcement machineries remain as a watch dog in the due enforcement of Human Rights in India. The duty to protect human right of all individuals more particularly those are vulnerable remains more as a National obligation. The course intents to evaluate the Redressal mechanisms practiced in India.
